BOARD REPORTS

Your Board of Directors met March 3rd at 7 p.m. The Membership meeting was held March 17th also at 7 p.m. Minutes for both can be found on the Chapter website under Documents.

Your Chapter will be raffling off fun, outdoor equipment, such as rifles, shotguns, handguns, and compound bows, among other items. Last month, 50 tickets for a Ruger .308 rifle were sold out in 45 minutes. The next raffle starts March 3rd with tickets for sale until the March Membership meeting. LAKE AND CONSERVATION REPORT

Opening Day!

The Chapter held its annual Opening Day event on March 19 with perfect weather and everyone had a great time! The members only Opening Day event celebrates the first trout stocking of the year with free coffee, breakfast sandwiches and the world's greatest hot chocolate. We had about 40 members fishing for trout and Harold Whitacre's Special Events Committee served 110 cast iron cooked breakfast sandwiches. This event would not have been possible without the volunteers that donated their time including Rick Wright, Mike Keenan, Charles Weiss and Jeff McCall. The chapter raised \$221 with donations and 50/50 proceeds to help cover the cost of the event.

Lake Neff Guest Policy

A common question asked of the committee is guests fishing Lake Neff. Unlike the ranges, there is no policy for guests fishing on the lake. The primary problem with a guest policy is the price. The cost of trout has risen, like everything else, and where the ranges charge \$10, that would not cover the cost of trout if a guest catches their limit. The chapter has

also spent tens of thousands of dollars on the lake over the past 3 years for species stocking and improvement, weed control, aeration, and dam safety. Our populations of trout, bass and catfish are consistently breaking chapter records for size and overall catch totals. Couple these costs with the popularity of the lake since the beginning of COVID and the rise of the price of ammunition, and we are now seeing Lake Neff member usage at an all-time high.

Unfortunately, we cannot allow members to bring guests to fish our lake.

We are a 501c3 non-profit organization with our primary focus of getting youth into the outdoors. We do allow youth groups to fish the lake during their event (camping or lake pavilion special events). These groups, other than our annual kids fishing derby, primarily fish for panfish. Many times, youth groups will request chapter volunteers or loaner equipment to assist with the event. This is part of our Izaak Walton mission. Other groups, such as veterans groups, may also use the lake with Board approval. Lake Neff is one of the primary resources our chapter uses to complete the needed events required for renewal of our non-profit status.

Please understand our situation and respect the rules. The lake and conservation volunteers spend hundreds of hours improving the lake every year for the enjoyment of our members and youth. We are always looking for assistance and consider joining the committee.

Eagle Scout Project Completed at Lake Neff!

The chapter would like to extend a very special thank you to Boy Scout Teddy Rudolph for the completion of his Eagle

Scout project of a fish cleaning station on Lake Neff. Teddy is a Life Scout with BSA Troop 63 and his project turned out amazing with a granite top and stainless steel sinks. The new fish cleaning station was heavily used during the Opening Day event and will be used by chapter volunteers during the Kids Fishing Derby to provide fish cleaning service



for the first time. We ask members to dump the remains from their fish cleaning back into the lake where it will provide a food source for bottom feeders such as crayfish. This recycling of organic matter is critical for the health of our aquatic environment, and we cannot thank Teddy enough for his work. The chapter would like to thank Lake and Conservation member Jeff McCall who acted as the Chapter representative. The Chapter would like to wish Teddy the best of luck on his Board of Review on his journey to the rank of Eagle Scout.

Portable Sawmill

The Chapter will be bringing in a portable sawmill this spring for the first time. The committee has multiple trees that have fallen that are being collected to create lumber products. Typically, downed trees are used for firewood but with the removal of the pine trees by the chapter house, we have plenty for campground use. The committee could use some volunteers to assist with the sawmill including stacking and moving cut lumber on May 14. The campground will be closed on that weekend. The chapter does donate some wood to local wood workers. If you are a wood worker and would like to be included, please contact Brian Callahan. We simply ask for a finished product as a donation. We would prefer to see the wood used for its natural beauty as opposed to it being used as firewood.

Please contact Brian also for pine firewood. The committee has cut and stacked about 10 cords for use in the campground. We will be splitting the remaining pine in the chapter house parking lot this spring.

Chapter Campgrounds

The chapter campgrounds are filling up!!! The committee created a new campsite last year and are always working on improvements. If members have an interest in camping, make your reservations now!!! Reservations are not required but open weekends are also being requested by Boy Scouts, Cub Scouts, Trail Life and American Heritage Girls youth groups. The calendar is filling up and don't miss this opportunity for a great camping experience!!!

Aeration

The bubbles on Lake Neff are the Chapter's new aeration system. The lake and Conservation team installed a new

aeration system with heads located throughout lake Neff. Aeration is key to correcting some of the issues with the lake. The most important component of aeration is cycling healthy bacteria from the surface to the bottom of the lake to assist with decomposition. These bacteria will assist with the breakdown of organic materials which are



slowly filling in the lake. We are hoping aeration will also assist with moving the water and avoiding the large outbreaks of the surface level vegetation such as duckweed which occur in stagnant water. We are also hoping the oxygen rich water enriches the fish species in the lake.

Rick Hill was instrumental in designing and specifying the equipment needed. Rick also flipped the switch for the first time and inaugurated the system.



This project took 9 months and an entire team to implement including John Whitacre, Brad Whitacre and Terry Henry who were instrumental in getting power to the lake. We

also need to thank Steven Rhodes who fixed the solar panels.

RANGE REPORT

Bullseye Precision Competition/.22 Pistol & Rifle

Returning for another exciting season, your Chapter will soon be starting Bullseye Pistol and Precision Rifle competitions. These fun and informally competitive shoots are open to IWLA members, their spouses, and appropriately aged children under parental supervision, and we welcome shooters of all experience levels! We anticipate starting in early May and running through October, with pistol shooting on the first and third Monday and rifle shooting on the second and fourth Monday. Watch this newsletter space or an email to all Chapter members announcing the date of the first event.

The Rifle and Pistol Range will be closed to members not participating in the competition from 4:00 to 6:30 each Monday.

Shooters and competition organizers agree to abide by and adhere to the range and safety rules and regulations posted at the range and available on the Chapter website and IWLA Winchester Chapter Range Qualification is required of each participating shooter.

Bullseye Pistol – Course of Fire

Shooters are required to use a .22LR pistol, semi-automatic preferred, and will need 70 rounds of ammunition (10 for sighting-in/warm up if desired; 60 for score). Revolvers allowed but are a real challenge in the rapid-fire shooting segment (five shots in 10 seconds). Open sights, red dot sights, and scopes are allowed. Shooters can use either one-hand (conventional military/NRA), or two-hand (defense stance) as their pistol holding grip. Separate scoring categories for each.

The shooter will fire a total 60 rounds in three sets of 20 rounds each, at three separate bullseye targets set 25 yards downrange.

Set 1: Slow fire - 20 shots in 20 minutes.

Set 2: Timed fire - Four 20-second sets of five shots each.

Set 3: Rapid fire - Four 10-second sets of five shots each.

Maximum score: 600 points.

Precision Rifle – Course of Fire

Shooters are required to use a .22LR repeater rifle (bolt, pump, semi-auto action) and will need 50 rounds of ammunition (10 for sighting-in/warm up if desired; 40 for score). As with Bullseye pistol, open sights, red dot sights, and scopes are allowed.

The shooter will fire 40 rounds in two sets of 20 rounds each at two separate bullseye targets 25 yards downrange. All shooting will be done off-hand (standing), with no sling support or Olympic-style shooting coat allowed. The shooter can request 50-yard targets to increase his challenge but cannot alter any other parameters of the course of fire and does not receive a score handicap for a longer range.

Set 1: Slow fire - 20 shots in 10 minutes.

Set 2: Rapid fire – Four 20-second sets of five shots each.

Maximum score: 400 points.

NRA Classification Scoring

Scores are not submitted to the NRA. While this course of fire is very similar to what the NRA runs for its





classification, the NRA does not allow for a two-handed stance. These official rank classifications, however, enable you to see how you might rank against other shooters across the country who participate in official NRA competitions and other competitions with similar courses of fire.

To calculate your percentage, divide your total score by the maximum total score (600 for pistol, 400 for rifle).

Lanternfly Part Deux

Last month your editor included information on the Lanternfly infestation and how to identify egg masses. Fellow lke Dave Campbell of White Post wrote the following article on his work at eradicating this pest on his farm, Hidden Mysteries.

We noticed the Spotted Lantern Fly (SLF) about 3 years ago. I reported it the state and they came out to review the area and discuss options. After the visit I was more familiar



with the identification of the Tree of Heaven and how to identify it. I spent hours walking the woods trying to find the tree in the early fall of 2021 when it is easy to identify. Once I found the tree I marked it with pink ribbon.

The local Coop informed me that cutting down the tree and burning it was

the quickest and cheapest method of control for the SLF. With their direction I spent a few weeks during the late winter of 2021 cutting down about 30 Tree of Heaven and burning them in my burn pit. Per their direction after felling the tree I painted the trunks with a 100% solution of Roundup.

The Tree of Heaven is a tree that has root suckers that extend through the area and sprout up in adjacent areas.



The intent of the Roundup was to stop the suckers from continued growth after the parent tree was removed.

During the summer of 2022 I noticed that I

had missed identifying many trees and our infestation was worse. I re-walked the woods and after marking the trees I also saw that some of the stumps from my tree removal work in winter of 2021 had new growth coming from them.

I made a visit to the local coop and after a discouraging meeting and little help due to multiple issues I began a search with the Penn State program. They seem to be on the cutting edge of this research for the SLF and how to control it.

I decided to begin a hack and squirt method of control with the Tree of Heaven. That involves cutting the bark and squirting a specific herbicide chemical into the new tree wound. If this is performed during the late fall when the leaves are beginning to drop it is effective. The sap of the tree is moving down the trunk to the roots and putting the herbicide under the bark allows the chemical to travel down the tree and kill it at the roots. With the roots of the treated tree also connected to the surrounding trees through the ground the hope is that the herbicide with travel through the roots and kill the adjacent trees as well. After I used the hack and squirt method of control on the tree I used a different colored marking ribbon on the tree. This allows me to know that a tree has been treated and if I missed treating any. While treating trees if is rather easy to miss some.

Currently I am waiting for spring and summer to see if the herbicide treated trees are dead or dying. I have many trees and it will take years of effort and funds to rid the property of the Tree of Heaven which is the preferred tree of the Spotted Lantern Fly.

This fall it is my plan to use the hack and squirt method again on trees that I missed treating this past fall. I will continue to identify and flag trees in the hopes of removing the tree from our property. I realize that the tree and the SLF are here to stay. I see the trees everywhere and many people to nothing to control them. I can only do my own small part to try and control them.





Thank you, Dave. Good luck in your eradication attempts and keep us posted!


Found Wedding Band
