Our annual food drive concluded yesterday with the proceeds being delivered to the local food bank by lke Tino Peabody and family.



LAKE AND CONSERVATION REPORT

Tree Removal – Chapter Closure





a 65' pine on the lake near the Layman shelter has a large crack running the full length of one of the main limbs. This section is about 15" thick and roughly 30' high, extending out near the shoreline over the lake. This section is now causing the main trunk to develop a crack also.

The Chapter will be having a tree service remove the pine tree, currently marked off with caution tape. The road will be closed during this operation which is expected to take 4 hours. There will be no access to any resources beyond that point during the removal operation. The following areas will be closed until about 1 p.m.

- All ranges
 - Shotgun
 - Rifle/Pistol
 - Archery
- All campgrounds and trails
- Lake Neff beyond Layman Shelter

They may open early depending on how quickly the tree can be removed.





Chapter Workday Recap

Saturday November 12 was a busy day at the chapter as we had chapter workday during the day and Millbrook Marching Band bonfire that evening. Millbrook marching band's end of year bonfire was a tremendous success again this year. The students and parents were fantastic guests, and many thanked us on their way out of the park. The bonfire area was completely cleaned up by noon the next day.

Eric Raybuck coordinated the activities which included 23 volunteers who worked very hard on some big projects.

Repair erosion damage on Shockey bridge

Volunteers moved an estimated 3 tons of concrete cylinders to correct the erosion problem under Shockey bridge. We may need to move more cylinders



aroun<mark>d the bank but the most serious issue is corrected. This project is 80% complete.</mark>

Repair erosion damage on Rifle Pistol

Good news is that we dumped and arranged 1.5 tons of cylinders which has corrected the problem. Bad news is that we have lost 4 feet of stream bank since the problem was first discovered.



Remove driftwood debris from Lake Neff

Volunteers removed submerged logs and branches from Lake Neff using a grappling hook. The driftwood was cut up with chainsaws on the bank. The volunteers filled the backhoe bucket 9 times and the wood was deposited next to the splitter.

Several volunteers spent the morning splitting wood.



Cleaning and repairing chapterhouse gutters

The gutters around the chapterhouse were cleaned and repaired. Half of a 5 gallon bucket was filled with roofing nails, roofing pieces and debris from the gutter elbows. A section of gutter was straightened and returned to position. Gutter sections by the porch were reattached but the wood is rotten so it's a temporary fix.

Limbing trees on the hill between the chapterhouse and the lake

Lower limbs on the trees were removed to assist with mowing.

Autumn olive, tree removal and brush hogging the dam

Autumn olive removal was started by the lower dam. 2 trees were removed by the discharge pipe. An additional 12 feet was brush hogged and will be maintained as mowable area. These were all tasks required by the engineer report as part of our previous dam inspection. The work in this area is 40% complete.

Daffodils on the bank below the Izaak Walton Park sign

The steep bank below the Izaak Walton Park sign at the front entrance had 80+ daffodil bulbs planted. This area is very difficult to weed and we continue to improve the look of our front entrance. The bulbs were donated by member Steve Nurkowski.

Final Note

On a side note, we usually close all areas during a chapter work day. We were unwilling to do that this session because of the date being so close to the opening of deer hunting season and the importance to members to get rifles sighted in. Because we could not close the rifle pistol range, we also did not close the other areas. We expect to close all chapter resources at the next workday and all future sessions.
